United States Wins Team, Sweeps All-Events At 2019 PABCON Men's Championships

LIMA, Peru - There aren't formal timeouts in bowling, but when **Team USA** head coach Rod Ross saw his team's energy and communication in need of a boost Saturday at the **Pan American Bowling Confederation Men's Championships**, he pulled the competitors aside and did what any coach would do - he explained what he was seeing from his perspective and offered words of inspiration.

The rallying moment came after the fourth frame of their first game at the new Bowling Center of La Villa Deportiva Nacional (VIDENA), and his encouragement ignited a fire in his well-balanced team, which is a combination of youth and experience.

The re-energized group then pulled away from the 16-team field and went on to win the five-player team gold medal by nearly 300 pins. It was the second consecutive time, and 15th time overall, Team USA claimed the title, and the momentum also helped the group sweep the all-events medals.

Team USA rolled games of 1,119, 1,186 and 1,112 on Saturday to remain atop the standings with a 6,929 six-game total, a new PABCON Championships record. The group posted three-game sets of 3,512 on Friday and 3,417 on Saturday.

This year's performance topped the previous record of 6,817, set by Team USA at the 2016 event in Cali, Colombia.

Canada, also the team runner-up to Team USA in 2016, earned this year's silver medal with a 6,636 total. Puerto Rico jumped over Colombia in the final game to secure the bronze medal with a 6,588 performance.

"We came out today a little flat, and it seemed like our guys were bowling more to protect the small lead we had from yesterday, rather than leaving that in the past and trying to win today's three games," Ross said. "To win the day, you have to win the games. To win the games, you have to win the frames. To win the frames, you have to win the shot. After I pulled them aside, they really turned things around, and we're excited to come away with the gold medal."

AJ Johnson led the way for Team USA in the six team games, posting a 1,441 total. That included a 279 finish and 783 series Saturday. He was followed by Darren Tang (1,410), Nick Pate (1,381), Sean Wilcox (1,294), John Janawicz (702), Perry Crowell (701).

The team competition was the only event of the 2019 PABCON Men's Championships that was contested over two days (three games each day), compared to the singles, doubles and trios events, which all featured six consecutive games.

For some teams and bowlers, there was potential for a slowing of momentum, while others had an opportunity to regroup and consider a new strategy for attacking the 41-foot World Bowling Rome oil pattern.

Team USA experienced a little of both, as it took a few frames on Day 2 to find the right energy level and pace, while a few lanes away, Janawicz's clear mind allowed him to catapult up the all-events standings and into the cut for the week-ending Masters event.

He started the final day in 30th place and used a 748 series to move himself up to 16th place, earning the final spot in match play with a 5,300 total, a 220.83 average for 24 games.

The Masters portion of the tournament will feature the top 16 players in the all-events standings, who will bowl best-of-three head-to-head matches Sunday. All-events included six games in each event (singles, doubles, trios and team).

Team USA's Tang, Johnson and Wilcox sat comfortably in the top three spots in the all-events standings heading into the final game, but only 10 pins separated first and third place. Canada's Francois Lavoie was 50 pins behind with a game to go. In the finale, focused solely on making sure Team USA locked up the team gold medal, Johnson rolled his highest

game of the week, 279, to secure his second and third gold medals of the tournament. He and Wilcox won doubles earlier in the week with a record total.

Johnson's 5,690 all-events total, a 237.08 average, also was a PABCON Championships record, topping the previous mark of 5,644, posted by Canada's Zach Wilkins in 2016.

"The individual things are nice, but we came here with one goal, and that was the team gold," said Johnson, a 26-year-old right-hander and five-time Team USA member. "I wanted to make sure we kept our foot on the gas the last game because the talented teams we were up against could put together a big game at any time. Sean had a hard time seeing things the last game, but we're a team, and I wanted to do my part to help pick him up."

Tang (5,655) came away with the all-events silver medal, finishing 35 pins behind Johnson, and Wilcox, despite a 137 final game, held on for the bronze (5,547). Lavoie needed a mark in his final frame to pass Wilcox, but a 4-6-7-10 split, which he was unable to convert, left him seven pins short (5,540). Pate also advanced to the Masters event with a sixth-place all-events finish (5,469), but Crowell fell below the cutline, finishing 35th with 5,105.

Johnson's success couldn't have come at a better time for him, during a year that has been a little bit challenging. He's still getting comfortable with some new bowling equipment, he made a switch from 16-pound balls to 15, and after not initially being selected to this year's Team USA roster, he did all he could to be ready for this event after finding out he'd been added to the team.

"I'm not really having the greatest PBA Tour season so far, and I was fighting some things, so it took a lot of extra work to try to figure things out," Johnson said. "I've been trying to find myself, and it has progressively gotten better. When I got the call inviting me to be on the team for 2019, I worked extra hard to make sure I was sharp for this event and could contribute as much as possible."

Janawicz, a 46-year-old right-hander and USBC Hall of Famer, also hoped to contribute to the team's success this week, whether it be with his scores or knowledge and experience. He has been a regular on the PABCON stage during his nine Team USA appearances, and he has collected nearly two dozen medals along the way.

Though he struggled compared to his teammates at times this week, he never stopped trying to find the right ball, trick or strategy that would help him help the team.

Entering the final three games as the sixth man, his plan was to scout the lanes his teammates would be going to, so he could relay information toward the conclusion of their gold-medal run. If he could manage a big day of his own, finishing in the top 16 would be a nice bonus.

"I got off to a good start today, and knowing I was about 100 pins off the pace, I'd need a big overall effort," said Janawicz, who has earned multiple Masters gold medals at the PABCON Championships. "I tried something different on the fresh I hadn't tried all week, and that was to curve it more, which worked pretty well. I was fortunate to make the Masters cut, and we won the team gold, so it was a pretty great day all the way around. You just have to keep going and keep fighting, and today was one of those days."

The 100 bowlers at the 2019 PABCON Men's Championships competed for medals in singles, doubles, trios, team and all-events. Four more medals will be awarded Sunday in the Masters competition.

This week's tournament featured countries from North, Central and South America and the Caribbean, including Argentina, Aruba, Bahamas, Bermuda, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, United States, Uruguay and Venezuela.

The 2019 PABCON Men's Championships also was the first event to take place at the newly constructed bowling center, which is part of an expansive athletic complex that will be home to the 2019 Pan American Games this summer.

USBC Hall Of Fame Welcomes Seven New Members

LAS VEGAS – The United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame officially added seven members Wednesday night when it held its induction ceremony of the 2019 class at The Orleans.

Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, Finland native Mika Koivuniemi, and Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey, were inducted for Superior Performance, the late Jim St. John was added in the Veterans category, Larry Lichstein of Fort Myers, Florida, was inducted in the Pioneer division and, for Meritorious Service, the late John Davis and veteran bowling writer Bob Johnson of Las Vegas joined the USBC Hall of Fame.

Barnes, 49, owns 19 Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) Tour titles, including three majors – the 2005 U.S. Open, 2006 PBA Tournament of Champions and 2011 PBA World Championship. He earned PBA Rookie of the Year honors in 1998 and was the 2007-2008 PBA Player of the Year, making him one of five bowlers to have won both awards. He was elected to the PBA Hall of Fame in 2018.

He captured 22 gold medals as a 16-time member of Team USA, the most appearances on the team by any male bowler. He announced his retirement from Team USA earlier this year and was honored by USBC, along with longtime teammate Tommy Jones, during the USBC Convention on Wednesday afternoon. “As I look around, I’m simply in awe of the accomplishments and the legendary pioneers in this room that inspired me and so many other people to achieve things greater than they ever thought they could,” Barnes said. “While the PBA Tour allowed me to provide for my family and made me bowling famous, it is the bowling I did within the USBC that shaped my life.

“Following in the footsteps before me, of many of you, it has long been a goal of mine to make the USBC Hall of Fame through USBC accomplishments. And I like to think I’m not done yet.”

Koivuniemi, 52, currently lives in the United Arab Emirates and has coached the UAE national team since 2015. He joined the PBA Tour at age 32, earning the first two of his 14 career PBA titles in major events – the 2000 USBC Masters and the 2001 U.S. Open – to earn the nickname Major Mika.

He captured a third major at the 2011 PBA Tournament of Champions and was a two-time PBA Player of the Year (2003-2004, 2010-2011). He was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame earlier this year.

“What a year 2019 has been for me, making two big hall of fames in the same year,” Koivuniemi said. “There are so many people throughout the world who have helped me. I still remember my first (USBC) Open Championships in Reno in 1995 at the new stadium. It was something to see how it ran so smoothly with so many bowlers. I remember my first Masters and U.S. Open in 1996 – great memories and experiences – and then being lucky enough to win both of them as my first two titles.”

Kulick, 42, made history in 2010 when she captured the PBA Tournament of Champions title, becoming the first woman to win a PBA Tour event. She captured Professional Women’s Bowling Association (PWBA) Rookie of the Year honors in 2000 and won the first of her six major titles at the 2003 U.S. Women’s Open.

She is a 15-time Team USA member and her international resume includes a then-record performance in winning gold in singles at the 1999 World Bowling World Championships, the first of her 22 career gold medals.

“To witness the people walking through that door earlier, the hall of famers and everyone here ... I just thankful for this moment,” Kulick said. “I learned a lot from my elders, but since commentating on the youth and collegiate events, it’s the youth who inspire me to pave the way for future generations.”

She also referenced a former Team USA teammate about what reaching the hall of fame means to her future on the lanes.

“Liz Johnson sat up here a few years ago and said just because she’s in the hall of fame doesn’t mean she’s done,” Kulick said. “Me, too. I am not done.”

St. John, who served in the Navy for nine years before turning to bowling full time, won six titles on the PBA Tour from 1963-1969 and captured a USBC Open Cham-

pionships Classic Team title in 1964. He died on Jan. 11, 1987.

His most dominating performance came at the 1963 World Invitational, one of the most prestigious tournaments in bowling, that took place in Chicago. St. John set 12 tournament records, tied two others, and posted the only 300 game over the course of the 11-day tournament. He successfully defended his title at the 1964 event.

Members of St. John’s family were unable to attend the induction ceremony, but his daughter, Karen Hayward, relayed a message from the family, including her mom, Delores, and her brother, Ron.

“My family and I would like to thank the USBC Hall of Fame committee for recognizing my father in the Veterans category,” Hayward said in her letter. “When my brother and I were very small, we would travel around the U.S. with our parents to all of the bowling tournaments. ... I also enjoyed watching my dad and the other bowlers on the Falstaff bowling team. They did a lot of trick bowling. I haven’t seen anything like it since. My family and I have a lot of wonderful memories of our bowling family. Thank you again to the USBC and everyone involved.”

Lichstein, 69, who was elected to the PBA Hall of Fame in 1996 in the Meritorious Service Category, made his mark as the long-time director of player services for the PBA. He started his PBA career as a bowler in 1969, becoming the youngest PBA Rookie of the Year at the time of his selection, and won his lone PBA title at the San Jose Open in 1970.

In May 1974, Lichstein changed career paths, and for more than 22 years, would serve as the PBA Director of Player Services, where he equipped, fit, maintained and served up to 300 PBA Tour bowlers each week. He also owns two Open Championships titles, winning Classic All-Events in 1969 and Classic Team in 1970.

“When I got the call, Nov. 2 (from USBC President Karl Kielich), that was my son’s 50th birthday,” Lichstein said. “It was a tough day, I cried a lot, because I love the sport and I couldn’t believe it was happening. I really thought it wasn’t true, but he finally convinced me it was. This is really such a special day for me.”

Davis, who passed away on Jan. 25, 2013, at age 64, started Kegel in 1981 on the heels of developing The Key™ Lane Cleaning Tool, which provided bowling centers a better and more economical way to clean lanes. With a goal of making “two lanes play the same,” he became a leading innovator and expert in the field of lane maintenance throughout a career that had a major impact in the sport.

In addition to the lane machines, conditioners, cleaners and other items he developed, he opened the Kegel Training Center in 1997, moving it to its current location in Lake Wales, Florida, in 2003, to give bowlers and coaches the latest technological advances to take their knowledge to the next level. His last invention was the Kegel LaneMapper, which measures lane topography.

“My father was a very humble man,” said Davis’ son, Chris. “He didn’t care about the rewards, or the awards, he just wanted to fix bowling. He accomplished so much over the years. He was truly a family man and loved the sport of bowling. ... What a life, what a life. What a great honor this is.”

His brother, Mark Davis added, “John had a passion for servicing the bowling industry. He spent much of his time on the phone with people all over the world, discussing the game and all aspects of it. He would call people out of the blue and talk to them for hours about nothing but bowling. I don’t doubt that some of those people are in the room now.”

Johnson, 61, of Las Vegas, has been at the forefront of telling bowling’s stories for nearly five decades. He has been honored with 75 national writing awards for his work covering the sport and industry, and has served on the USBC Hall of Fame committee since its formation.

In 2009, Johnson was selected as the Bowling Writers Association of America (now International Bowling Media Association) Luby Hall of Fame Award winner, and was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame earlier this year.

“Looking back, I’m grateful for those tough days because they forced me to be a better researcher, a better interviewer and a better writer,” Johnson said about his start as a journalist. “I had to become a better writer to get more assignments and, over time, that is what happened.”

The USBC Hall of Fame was created in 2005 by merging the former American Bowling Congress and Women’s International Bowling Congress Halls of Fame.

With the induction of the seven-member class of 2019, there are 432 members of the USBC Hall of Fame – 223 in Superior Performance, 120 in Meritorious Service, 51 in Veterans, 22 in Pioneers and 16 in Outstanding USBC Performance.

The Man Behind Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes, Citrus Heights

Steve Cook has owned Fireside Lanes in Citrus Heights since 2014. Citrus Heights bowlers have retired professional bowler Steve Cook to thank for keeping their beloved Fireside Lanes going strong at 7901 Auburn Blvd. In 2014, Cook stepped in to buy the 32-lane bowling center when he thought it might close.

"I bowled at Fireside Lanes when I was young. I saw the condition the center had deteriorated to. I felt if I didn't come in to save it, it would have shut down," Cook told The Sentinel in a recent phone interview.

The 6-foot 7-inch Cook, a retired left-handed, ten-pin bowler and member of the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame in 1993.

Today, his Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes employs 35 to 40 people to manage the day-to-day operation of the lanes and operate the snack bar. Most of his regular business is based on league play.

"I'm honestly grateful to the people of Citrus Heights for their ongoing support," Cook said.

The bowling center opened as Fireside Lanes in 1959. Now known as Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes, the center is the sixth oldest continuing business in Citrus Heights, according to a "Top 20" oldest business list compiled by the city.

For decades, the bowling center had been a mainstay of the Citrus Heights and Sacramento area, providing quality entertainment to families, amateurs and professionals alike. "We made about \$650,000 worth of much needed improvements including a new roof, upgraded bathrooms, new setters and new ball returns," Cook said.

The center features a Pro Shop and a Hall of Fame Bar & Grill offering hot meals and snacks. A sports bar to watch sporting events is also a popular draw.

Cook, 62, won his first PBA title at the age of 21 and finished with 15 titles in his career. Among the titles were major championships at the 1981 PBA Tournament of Champions, the 1983 Touring Players Championship, and the 1986 U.S. Open (one of four total titles he earned in 1986 alone).

Cook is the brother-in-law of fellow PBA Hall of Fame bowler Mike Aulby. After retiring from competition, Cook developed his own bowling supply business with two locations, one in Sacramento and a second in Southern California, which serves the wholesale bowling industry by selling a complete line of bowling balls, bags, apparel and accessories.

Bowling remains the most popular participatory sport in the United States, with millions of people bowling each year. In the United States, the bowling industry currently generates about \$6 billion in revenues annually.

Since he took ownership, Cook said overall business income at Fireside Lanes has been stable.

"We place a great emphasis on customer service," he said, crediting his staff and on-site manager, Jack Thomas, for helping keep customers coming back for more.

So what's ahead for the bowling center?

"We want to spend our money on improvements wisely. I'm hoping in the future to make additional improvements and refresh the outside with new



paint and redo the parking lot," Cook said. He's also pleased the city is working to revitalize Auburn Boulevard through a \$20 million infrastructure project that will extend from Rusch Park to the Roseville border.

Looking to the future, he said the center has had a popular youth league through the years which continues to attract younger bowlers to the sport.

Cook describes his Fireside Lanes as having a "classic, gimmick-free" appeal, while some bowling centers are taking a more active entertainment center style approach.

His preference, he said, is to "keep flash to a minimum, and concentrate on good customer service."

Monday through Thursday Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes offers dollar games from 3 to 6 p.m. and \$3 shoe rental. On Fridays, dollar games are offered from 3 to 6:30 p.m. and shoe rental drops to just a buck.

The center offers all you can bowl Cosmic Bowling under the lights on Saturday evenings from 10 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. for \$15, including shoe rental. Karaoke is a popular attraction on Wednesday and Sunday evenings from 9 p.m. to midnight, and Friday and Saturday from 9 p.m. to 1:30 a.m.

According to the bowling center's website, the best times for open play bowling during the day is Monday through Friday from 3-5:30 p.m. Other times are also posted online, but the center notes that open play lanes may not be available during league play and are subject to a waiting list.

General hours of operation for Steve Cook's Fireside Lanes are Sunday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to midnight, and Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1:30 a.m.

"We're in Citrus Heights to stay. We're doing our best to keep the center very family friendly," Cook said.

Helen Duval's Bowling Tips

The Helen Duval Legacy (1916 - 2010)

Wherever she went and whoever she touched, people were affected by Helen Duval. "She made me feel like a million dollars," said Joan Taylor of E. Stroudsburg, Pa. "I was at a pro am where she was and she tried to help my game, as bad as it was. But, she was always gracious and beautiful inside and out. She definitely left a wonderful legacy."

A life long resident of Berkeley, Helen seemed destined for greatness. Her death leaves an empty space in many venues enjoyed by the bowling world. She brought enthusiasm to everything she did – her professional bowling, her teaching, her work with the VA hospitals for the National BVL Fund, her gardening and her ability to put together an outstanding meal. Then, there was the never ending instructional material she reamed out for bowling papers and the WIBC Woman Bowler magazine.

Not many people know she was a talented milliner at Addys in Oakland, Calif., but also an expert seamstress who not only churned out beautiful clothing for herself, but taking on such tasks as "lined" vests and scarves for the entire California WBA board of directors. Addys was across the street from a bowling alley. On occasion, she would watch the bowlers while waiting for her bus. One day, someone asked her if she would like to try bowling and, at the age of 22, her entire life was about to change. She was a natural.

About this same time, Helen Davidson met Rosaire Duval. "Rosy" owned an eight lane bowling alley where he had numbered the lanes from 41 to 48 because people kept referring to his "little" bowl. He was the ultimate promoter and loud and crazy, but you couldn't help but love him. He charmed Helen and soon they were married.

The Duvals had two sons, Robert and Richard. When their son Richard developed polio at age five, Helen introduced her own brand of therapy to his fitness program. She held him by the back of his belt at the foul line and taught him to bowl. Eventually, Richard would book 208, become a pro, and travel the world with his mother on her many visits to the VA medical facilities demonstrating that anyone can find enjoyment in bowling.

Helen had become more involved in their bowling business and had a special affinity for youth bowling. She put together a match team and contacted other bowls to do the same. Her team had four boys and one girl – Elaine Hagin. This was a forerunner for traveling youth match teams. There was no youth organization so they all joined the adult WIBC/ABC. The parent organizations were pushing youth bowling and Milt Raymer was working on their behalf to create districts throughout the U.S. to form youth bowling organizations. Helen was tapped to become the first certified instructor and junior coordinator for the west coast. One of bowling's most dynamic women, Helen Duval garnered an endless list of honors and awards recognizing her superior service to the bowling industry as well as her performance as a professional on the lanes. She touched people all over the U.S. and beyond with her clinics and motivational visits to VA hospitals. The more the challenge, the more it drove her.

Helen seemed to have inexhaustible energy and her enthusiasm was infectious. Everything she touched seemed to work. Though she never had a bowling lesson in her life, she was one of the nation's most effective clinicians, presenting the basics in simple, understandable terms. She was a picture bowler. "I attribute my good bowling to the junior program," she said, "It's good, basic bowling." She was a dedicated bowler, writer and teacher. She was a stickler for the rules, and a respected ambassador of her sport. Her enthusiasm filled a room, and her friends filled auditoriums. It was not unusual for Helen to command everyone to "get up" and she would give one of her famous Stand-Up clinics.

An example of Helen's incredible presence came from Joan Feinblum when she was working at Napa State Hospital where there was a group of emotionally disturbed young people. Joan got an idea and asked Helen if she would consider giving these kids a clinic at the Yountville old soldiers home bowling facility. In her inimitable way, Helen enthusiastically agreed. Joan arrived with 30 of these kids in hand and she said, "Because we rarely took them out because you could never be sure what any of them would do, we had nearly as many staff members." One particular boy did not talk and few approached him. When Helen got to him she high fived him slapping his hand hard – and in the process of getting him lined up sort of kicked his leg. Joan and staff were horrified but this boy loved Helen. Somehow he identified with her type of command and began to talk with her and in fact, his behavior changed completely from that time on.

In 1998, all of the California WBA clinicians were called together to put a procedure in place so that, in spite of teaching styles, there was a consistency in the clinic program. All arrived with suggestions – except Helen. Helen really thought that everyone should just conform to what she considered a tried and true method of teaching – hers. Like all things Helen Duval did – she did it her way.

The California WBA had Hospitality programs every year at convention time and many of the board members were extremely clever at putting their costumes together but it was hard to beat what Duval came up with. She was an incredible witch – crooked nose, snaggletooth, green face and all or a fabulous flapper.

She was a great cook. Have you ever tasted the wonderful cheese rolls at the Red Lobster restaurant? I tasted them first at Helen Duval's home. When you were at her home for get-togethers the fare was always elegantly served and wonderful tasting. Joan Feinblum tells a story of having been invited to Helen's for dinner. Joan was new on the scene and idolized Helen. She said, "My God – I thought I had arrived." Joan had also been a part of a wig league and was sporting her latest. Helen served soup. Animated Joan got a little overzealous and the wig just popped off of her head – into the soup! Joan said, "I was embarrassed and paralyzed – I didn't know what to do." So, she said she just took the wig out of the soup and put it back on her head.

Helen was the premier grower of African violets. When the flower was lucky enough to find its way into the Duval household – it simply grew. She had large clear glass bowls full of miniature African Violets and they adorned her window sills. Her signature gift when awarding her Helen Duval AMF award to an outstanding youth director was one of her violets which she always toted from home.

Helen Duval was a pioneer. She was most proud of having been the first woman appointed to the President's Council on Physical Fitness. In 1974, she was the first to be inducted into the California WBA Hall of Fame for Superior Performance. She was a charter member of the Professional Women's Bowling Association and the Ladies Professional Bowling Tour's first Lifetime Honorary Member. She was the first to receive AMF's national award, which later bore her name, for Outstanding Contribution to Youth Bowling. She was also the first woman inducted into the Alameda County BA's Hall of Fame.

She wrote a series of articles for the Woman Bowler magazine on bowling technique and talked me into doing a series of pictures showing "Right and Wrong." Of course, I was the one who did the "wrong." Bowling World Newspaper has carried her many timeless articles and continues to do so. In 1996 Helen Duval was the recipient of the Bowling Writers Association of America John O. Martino Award for Meritorious Service.

She captured two professional titles during her career and in 1961 captured the BPAA National Doubles title with long time friend Nobu Asami. In 1969 her Fitzpatrick Chevrolet team won the team event in the WIBC Championship Tournament and she won the All Events title. She was selected three times to the All-American Bowling team and held a 200 average in 1967.

She was a member of the LPBT Hall of Fame and in 1970 she was inducted into the WIBC Hall for Superior Performance. She was the recipient of the BPAA V.A. Wapensky Award, recognizing her contributions to the advancement of bowling, and listed in the 1982 Guinness Book of Records. The now defunct "Helen Duval Fan Club" had a large group of devotees who gathered each year at WIBC convention time for fun and "fund-raising" for youth scholarships. In 1993 she was honored as a Bowling Legend at the National bowling Hall of Fame and Museum's Salute to Champions. In 2007, she was the recipient of the BPAA Dick Weber Bowling Ambassador Award and is a member of the Senior Athletes Hall of Fame.

Duval toured the VA medical centers as the National BVL Fund's Honorary Chairperson for nearly 25 years. She was a Bronze Certified Coach and a symbol of enthusiasm in her clinics, and on the lanes. She traveled through all kinds of weather to remote destinations to do her job for BVL. So much so, at one point the National BVL committee decided Helen had to have a cell phone. She was not too excited about this. Not too long after, she flew into a city and then drove to a remote area. Something dictated that she stay a day longer but she failed to contact anyone. Her family and the BVL family was terrified that something had happened to her. They tried the cell phone and nothing. When she finally (casually) touched base they said, "How about your cell phone? Where is it?" "Oh," she said, "I keep it in the trunk of the car." And that pretty much told the cell phone story.

We could go around the U.S. and abroad and the stories would abound. All would echo one thing, "She will be missed." Helen will certainly be an addition to the big bowling center in the sky and teach them all how to do it "right."

Helen Jane Duval died in her sleep on July 29, 2010.



Where Have All The Pro Bowlers Gone?

As I continued my search for that Leanne Barrette-Hulsenberg thank you letter, I ran across another bit of memorabilia... a 1960's era autographed 8" x 10" photograph of professional bowler Don Glover of Bakersfield, California, who in his career won five Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) national titles and the ABC Masters at Knoxville in 1970.

I remember Don coming to our small bowling center in Sebastopol, California, as a representative of Ebonite International, makers of bowling balls, bags and accessories. He spent the day autographing photos, conducting clinics, bowling an exhibition against the top "lefties" in our area, and wrapping up the day with some trick shots.

One of the trick shots that made Glover famous was a spinning ball top. Now I don't know if it was because the lanes had just been resurfaced, or if there were specific weights that he had placed in the bowling ball, or just what the reason... but he set the ball on the lane and spun it very fast, like a top, and gave it a slight nudge.

Next, he went to the lounge and ordered a draft beer, as the ball continued its journey on the lane. Back and forth the ball would go, edging closer and closer to the pins, but never going into the gutters. About halfway through his beer, Glover came out to inspect the progress of the bowling ball as it had reached the pins.


He returned to the lounge, and the ball began a journey back to the foul line! Once he had finished his beer, Glover returned to the lanes and the ball had almost returned to its original location at the foul line. I tried for years to duplicate this trick, and was able to match the spinning ball maneuver which prevented the ball from entering the gutter most of the time, but was never able to conquer the "approach-to-pins-and-back-again" activity.

Whatever happened to Don Glover? As I began to research his whereabouts today, I learned that Don had passed away in 1998, at the tender age of 52. His memory has been immortalized in Bakersfield with the formation of the Don Glover Masters Tournament at AMF Southwest Lanes. Last year's event was postponed after a ten year run, but officials stated that the 11th annual edition will be contested in 2019.

As a youngster I remember pro bowlers like Glover visiting our local community quite often. There were AMF representatives Helen Duval, Bill Bunetta, and the husband and wife team of Jack and Jill Edler; Brunswick's "Silver Fox," Jim St. John; and even Tom Hennessey of the famous Budweiser team, who appeared at the local J.C. Penney for bowling ball promotions in the Sporting Goods Department.

Helen Duval was one of my favorites. She owned a bowling center in nearby Berkeley, California, and would bring bowlers every month to compete in Primo Liberator's 6 Game Sweeper at L & L Lanes in Sebastopol. Primo had a unique way of securing entries in the tournament. With every entry, you received a three-piece chicken dinner, complete with a scoop of salad, roll and a drink of your choice. Helen would often remark, "Even if I don't bowl that well, at least I get a free dinner!"

One of the things that's missing in bowling today are all of those personal appearances. When I was working for AMF we paid staff professionals a retainer, plus an additional fee from the sponsor for their formal appearance at a prearranged venue. The conversation that came from those exhibits was more than enough to pay for the festivities, as evidenced by my autographed photo of Don Glover that I've kept for over 50 years.

The United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships will return to Las Vegas' South Point Bowling Plaza in 2020, and will feature later start times and enhancements to the doubles/singles squads.

Registration for the 2020 Women's Championships opened April 22nd. Visit BOWL.com/WomensChamp for information and to register.

The 2020 event will run at South Point from April 18-July 5 (last team date). The squad times for the 2020 Women's Championships will be adjusted for a later start time and the addition of a premium time slot for doubles/singles squads. DIAMOND, SAPPHIRE DIVISIONS WITH NEW LEADERS AT 2019 USBC WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIPS

WICHITA, Kan. - Bowlers competing at Northrock Lanes continue to produce high scores this week at the United States Bowling Congress Women's Championships as four new leaders claimed their spot at the top of the standings along with the third perfect game of the 2019 event.

In the Diamond Division, USBC Hall of Famer Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey, finished Tuesday's excitement at the top of the all-events standings with a 2,211 total, while recent collegiate standouts Lauren Pate of Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota, and Jordan Newham of Aurora, Illinois, took over the doubles lead with 1,417.

In the Sapphire Division, Kellie Bowes of Eagan, Minnesota, edged her way into the top spot in all-events by a single pin with 1,630, and the mother-and-daughter pair of Tiffany and Brittany Friars of Greencastle, Indiana, took over the doubles lead with 1,090.

Kaidee Sutphin of Maitland, Florida, became the third bowler in two days to roll a 300 game at Northrock Lanes as she kicked off her singles set with 12 consecutive strikes on the way to a 694 series.

Diamond All-Events features bowlers with entering averages of 190 and above, while Diamond Doubles includes bowlers with combined entering averages of 380 and above. Sapphire All-Events includes bowlers with averages of 145-159, and Sapphire Doubles consists of bowlers with combined entering averages of 290-319.

Kulick, who was inducted into the USBC Hall of Fame earlier this month, was the fourth player to take the lead in Diamond All-Events on Tuesday and rolled sets of 775 in doubles, 737 in singles and 699 in team to post her highest all-events total in 20 appearances at the Women's Championships.

Other bowlers holding the lead Tuesday included Columbia's Maria José Rodriguez (2,196), Karsyn Lukosius of Brick, New Jersey (2,127), and Amanda Vermilyea of Apply Valley, Minnesota (2,116). Katie Thornton of Savannah, Georgia, started the day in first place with 2,098 and now sits in fifth place.

Kulick's on-lane accolades speak for themselves, with wins on the Professional Women's Bowling Association (PWBA) and Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) Tours and dozens of medals accrued through her time on Team USA.

One of the few events she had yet to break through at for a victory, though, is the Women's Championships. "It's eluded me so far," said Kulick, the 2007 and 2010 USBC Queens champion. "Last night, I heard everybody get announced for their titles at this event, and I'm still looking for one. This event is very special because everybody bowls it, and it would be great to associate my name with all the other champions at the 100th edition of this event."

Kulick became just the sixth player in event's storied history to surpass 2,200 for a nine-game total, and she minimized her mistakes with just two open frames. "I really paid attention to my equipment selection yes-

terday," Kulick said. "There were two less people on the pair from team, so the breakdown was not as quick. I was able to learn what my transitions were and capitalized on what I did last night and took it into today. I probably left 30 pins out there from two or three poorly executed shots, but it was a striking event. You had to have your striking shoes on, and I'm just glad I wore the same pair two days in a row."

Fans of collegiate bowling have grown accustomed to watching Pate and Newham compete against each other the last four years at McKendree and Vanderbilt, respectively, but they worked together Tuesday while



performing in the final frame to take the lead.

Pate delivered a double in the 10th, while Newham converted a 4 pin to push the pair past the 1,411 score posted just minutes before by Jessica Aiezza of Mechanicville, New York, and Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York. Wichita's Ricki Ellison and Georgia Drewes previously led with 1,385.

Pate led the overall effort with games of 221, 264 and 289 for a 774 series, and Newham bounced back after a 179 start to finish with 246 and 218 for 643. Both players were making their Women's Championships debut this week in Wichita.

"It's really awesome getting to bowl with Jordan," said Pate, who helped McKendree win the 2017 Intercollegiate Team Championships and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Women's Bowling Championship titles. "Bowling against her has always been an adventure, but we were able to come together when we needed it. I had great ball reaction, and she made a ball change and was able to get to where I was at on the lane and demolished them the last two games. If we're able to win the doubles title in our first time bowling this event, it would really be icing on the cake."

Both Pate and Newham recently graduated from their respective universities, and the pair of 22-year-old right-handers relied on their experiences gained from their time as student-athletes to get to the top of the leaderboard. "I figured we were going to have a pretty good shot at bowling well since our look yesterday on the fresh was really good," said Newham, who helped the Commodores claim the 2018 NCAA title and recently finished as the runner-up at the Intercollegiate Singles Championships. "Lauren had a phenomenal look, but I struggled a little bit the first

game. Once I got the right ball in my hand and started throwing it better, it was a really good time."

Bowes rolled the highest series and all-events total in her 24-year Women's Championships career to sneak past Dawne Byers of Bella Vista, Arkansas, who rolled 1,629 earlier in May.

The 53-year-old right-hander rolled 579 in singles, which also helped her into third place in Sapphire Singles, and added 532 in team and 519 in doubles.

Glenyce Klaers of St. Michael, Minnesota, leads Sapphire Singles with 579.

After an open in the eighth frame, Bowes rolled back-to-back strikes to put herself in position to take the lead. A 2-4-5 combination on her second shot of the 10th pushed her into a tie, and she was able to topple an additional pin to take the lead.

Bowes' has been performing well in tournaments this year after a strong performance at her state tournament, and she attributes that to staying positive and fine-tuning her line and technique.

"It's been a really good year," Bowes said. "I've been able to find a line and hold it, and I've been bowling really well. I've been taking a few extra seconds to make sure my technique is where I want it to be before releasing the ball, and it's proven to be great in the last month."

While the technique is important to success, Bowes also noted that getting to bowl with her friends assists with her positivity on the lanes.

"I'm proud of the way I've been bowling," Bowes said. "I know my friends are very supportive and happy. I just can't keep this smile off my face. This has just been a really great experience. The camaraderie of bowling is really just amazing."

The Friars bowled Sunday and used consistent sets to cruise into the top spot in Sapphire Doubles. Tiffany rolled games of 188, 195 and 169 for a 552 series, and

Brittany added 183, 150 and 205 for 538.

Carol O'Neil and Nancy Gensemer of Bozeman, Montana, previously led with 1,039.

Mother's Day served as their first time bowling together at the Women's Championships, and they credited their success to their focus on the lanes. "This is the first time we've bowled together at Nationals in doubles," said Tiffany, who made her second tournament appearance. "Staying in time and going slower on the release helped. Also, just knowing when to make small adjustments as needed."

Getting to share the day together on the lanes served as a special moment for both Tiffany and Brittany, and winning a gemstone trophy would make it even sweeter.

"If the score held and we became national champions, it would be unbelievable," Tiffany said. "For us to bowl together on Mother's Day would just make it more special."

Sutphin rolled the 30th perfect game in tournament history after finding some favorable ball reaction at Northrock Lanes which allowed her to play to her strengths.

"I actually haven't been bowling much, so I didn't really have any expectations for the tournament other than to have some fun with the group of girls I bowl with," said Sutphin, who finished her set with games of 204 and 190. "But, at the end of doubles, I saw a shape that I liked and was able to throw my favorite ball, so things kind of aligned. I was able to play in my comfort zone and create some room to miss.

"The first shot in the 10th was great, the second shot was OK and the third shot was questionable. I definitely got lucky on that one, but I'm happy I did." She was excited to add her name to the record books, but, most importantly, was excited to share the moment with her teammates.

"It's always special to shoot 300, but to do it with this group of girls and in such a big event makes it even more special," said Sutphin, who made her fifth tournament appearance and added sets of 632 in doubles and 542 in team for a 1,868 all-events total. "Knowing there have only been 30 of them in 100 years makes it really amazing."



O'Keefe Claims Title At 2019 PWBA Twin Cities Open

EAGAN, MN. - Reigning Professional Women's Bowling Association Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, collected her first title of 2019 and ninth career victory at the PWBA Twin Cities Open.

O'Keefe relied on her spare game throughout the week at Cedarvale Lanes to earn the top

seed for Saturday's stepladder finals, and she converted a 4 pin and delivered a strike in her final frame to secure a 189-182 win over England's Verity Crawley.

The 40-year-old right-hander claimed the \$10,000 top prize live on BowITV.com.

"It's incredible," said O'Keefe, a 15-time Team USA member. "When the tour started again, my dream was to win one title. Now, here I am sitting at nine and one step closer to reaching my next goal - 10 titles. It just feels so good with all of the hard work I've put in."

Although O'Keefe's spare shooting was strong throughout competition, it nearly derailed her in the title match. She missed a pair of 3-6-10 combinations on the left lane through the first seven frames, but still maintained a slight advantage in the match. She had built the lead after Crawley left back-to-back 2-8-10 splits on the left lane earlier in title tilt.

"I just missed them right off my hand," said O'Keefe, who also defeated Crawley in the title match of the **2018 PWBA Sonoma County Open**. "I knew it the second it left my hand. As the games progressed through each block, I was quickly moving left and balling down, so I knew I was going to stay committed to what got me here. Every shot I executed well in the title match was really, really good, but each of those 3-6-10s were poorly executed. I just made some bad shots."

O'Keefe stayed clean in the eighth and ninth frames, which gave Crawley, who rolled a strike in the ninth frame, the opportunity to deliver a pair of strikes in the 10th frame for the chance to claim her first career PWBA Tour title.

Crawley got to the pocket on her first shot but was unable to get the 10 pin to fall, putting O'Keefe in the position to mark for victory.

"I was so, so worried that those two spares I missed earlier in the match were going to cost me," O'Keefe said. "When I was looking at the 4 pin in the 10th, I just told myself to make it. I was very happy when I saw my spare shot was on line and there was no doubt I was making it. It definitely was a relief."

Crawley finished as the runner-up for the fourth time in her career, but she's walking away knowing the extra work she's put into preparing for this season is starting to pay off.

"Honestly, I threw both 2-8-10s really well and was happy with them in the moment," Crawley said. "Obviously, the lane said otherwise. If anything, they were a pinch fast, which isn't my tendency, but lately I've been trying to stay a bit more aggressive. I made the decision to move left and actually get around it a little bit more after the second 2-8-10, which looked better but wasn't able to get out the 10 in the 10th frame.

"I'm very positive coming away from this right now, though. I've worked very hard, and right now, I feel like my game is in a very good place. I think this just gives me an extra boost of confidence going into the next couple of weeks."

Crawley advanced to the title match after rolling a double in the final frame to shut out Bryanna Coté of Red Rock, Arizona, 210-196.

In the opening round of Saturday's stepladder, Crawley delivered 11 strikes on the way to victory against Colombia's Maria José Rodriguez, 266-201.

Competition at the PWBA Twin Cities Open included two eight-game qualifying blocks on Friday to determine the 32 players for Saturday's Round of 32.

New York Bowler Rolls 900 Series

ARLINGTON, Texas – Jeremy Milito said he had bowled on Lanes 1 and 2 of the Farmingdale Bowling Center about five times this season and not had much success.

But, bowling on the pair again Thursday night, the 26-year-old left-hander from Patchogue, New York, told himself he would try a different game plan, and it literally worked to perfection, as he became the 35th bowler to roll a 900 series, connecting for 36 consecutive strikes during the Epic Edge Trios league.

“It was absolutely surreal,” Milito said. “Our league is a full half-side, and there is another full league on the other side of the house. By the end, people were watching, and there was a huge crowd. It was dead quiet, they unplugged the games, no announcements – it was really quiet. It was a really awesome environment.”



Milito’s achievement is pending approval from the United States Bowling Congress and would be the second perfect series of the 2018-2019 season and 36th USBC-approved 900 overall. Jonathan Wilbur of North Clarendon, Vermont, rolled a 900 series on Jan. 14, 2019.

Milito’s 900 came on the first pair of the center, and he had recently shot 640 on that pair. He explained that Lane 1 was a lot tighter, and Lane 2 hooks early, so he used a stronger ball on Lane 1 and a weaker ball on Lane 2. He stuck with the same two balls the entire series.

Milito, who is a financial analyst, also had to clear a mental hurdle he had not encountered during an 878 series, his previous best series, shot two years ago.

“My longest run from the start had been the front 18, so after the first game and a half, it was uncharted territory,” Milito said. “Even with the 878, I shot 278 the first game, then went 300-300. So, I was little nervous in the 10th frame of Game 2, because I felt if I got the first two (300 games), then I have a chance at something really big.”

He said in Game 3, it was just all about taking it slow.

“Everyone was kind of staying away from me, like a pitcher with a perfect game, and the pace was really good, everyone going when it was their turn,” Milito said.

The first USBC-approved 900 occurred Feb. 2, 1997 when Jeremy Sonnenfeld rolled three consecutive perfect games in Lincoln, Nebraska.





TOM KOUROS, USBC HALL OF FAME, DIES AT AGE 92

ARLINGTON, Texas – Tom Kouros of Deer Park, Illinois, a United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame member, passed away at his home on April 28. He was 92.

Elected to the USBC Hall of Fame in 2009, Kouros is the best-selling author of *Par Bowling*, which sold more than 800,000 copies, and *Par Bowling: The Challenge*. As a coach, he conducted hundreds of clinics in the United States and in more than 20 countries world-

wide, and he also served as a technical adviser to the World Tenpin Bowling Association.

He was the longtime proprietor of River Rand Bowl in Des Plaines, Illinois, and served as president and secretary treasurer of Chicago's Northwest Bowling Proprietors' Association.

The co-founder and former president of the Mid-America Bowling Writers, he won numerous writing awards during his more than 30 years as a columnist for *Bowlers Journal International*.

Kouros received the Flowers for the Living Award in 2001, was the first recipient of the International Coach of the Year Award by the World Bowling Writers in 2002, and received the Louis Petersen Award from Illinois State Bowling Proprietors' Association in 2003. He also was honored by the Bowling Writers Association of America with the Rip Van Winkle Award in 1997.

He is a member of the Illinois Bowling Association Hall of Fame (2005) and was a 2009 inductee into the Bowling Coaches Hall of Fame.

Kouros is survived by his sister, Alice Malzahn, his children, Christopher Kouros (Theresa Griffin), Marcie Kouros, Tyson Kouros, Craig Kouros (Jodie Rowlett), and six grandchildren.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Wins PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open For 12th Career PBA50 Tour Title

Hall of Famer beats Sammy Ventura 288-205
in title match to move into tie for second on
PBA50 all-time win list

CLEARWATER, Fla. (April 17, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, won the PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open Wednesday for his 12th career title on PBA's tour for players 50 and over, moving him into a tie for second on the all-time titles list with three other players.

In the first tournament of the 2019 season, the 59-year-old Williams beat finals top qualifier Sammy Ventura of Syracuse, N.Y., 288-205, in the title match at Maple Country Lanes to tie Tom Baker, Gary Dickinson and Dale Eagle on the all-time list. John Handegard holds the record of 14 PBA50 Tour titles.

Technical difficulties prevented the finals from airing live on FloBowling but the stream will be archived for later viewing on www.flobowling.com.

"I wasn't really bowling well in qualifying until I made some ball changes later in the tournament where I could play outside and go straighter to the pocket," said Williams, who had to battle all the way from the cashers round. "I started getting a much better ball reaction as the tournament went on. I was finally able to get to the pocket and then it was just a matter of getting all the pins to go down."

In the semi-final match, Williams, who qualified second for the finals, also dominated by beating 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair of Albany, New York, 277-225.

LeClair, the 2017 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open winner, started the finals by beating No. 4 qualifier PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, 10-9, in a one-ball roll-off after tying the match 237-237. LeClair then went on to beat No. 3 qualifier Brian Kretzer of Dayton, Ohio, 238-213, to advance to the semifinal against Williams. Duke was trying for his sixth career PBA50 Tour title and Kretzer his second.

With his win, Williams, the PBA Tour's all-time titles leader with 47 wins, moved a step closer to becoming the all-time leader on both of PBA's national tours.

"If I'm going to challenge that record I'm going to need to get going," said Williams. "The senior tour keeps getting better and better which means it's going to be much harder to get the wins."

Williams' last win on the PBA50 Tour came in the 2017 USBC Senior Masters. He finished second three times in 2018 including the Johnny Petraglia BVL Open which was held at Farmingdale Lanes in Farmingdale, N.Y.

Ventura's second-place finish was his career best on the PBA50 Tour eclipsing his previous best of third in the 2017 Race City Open.

Auto Accident Claims PBA50 Double Lung Transplant Recipient David Williams Jr.

Omaha competitor was on his way to PBA50 Tour's first tournament in Clearwater, Florida

IOWA CITY, Iowa (April 12, 2019) — The Professional Bowlers Association today learned that David Williams Jr., 53, of Omaha has died of injuries sustained in an automobile accident Thursday while on

his way to compete in the opening tournament of the PBA50 Tour season in Clearwater, Florida.

Williams, a double lung transplant recipient, was a 27-year member of the PBA who had won two PBA Regional tournament titles and a PBA50 Regional title in Council Bluffs, Iowa, in 2016. After being diagnosed with sarcoidosis, an incurable hereditary form of lung cancer, Williams continued to bowl – commonly with an oxygen tank at his side to assist his breathing between shots.

Williams underwent his double lung transplant at the University of Iowa hospital in Iowa City on March 29, 2018, and less than a year later – on March 10, 2019 – he finished third in a Pre-Tournament Qualifier to earn a berth in the PBA's 10th anniversary World Series of Bowling in suburban Detroit.

Williams told the story of his battles and determination to continue competing to Bowlers Journal International editor Gianmarc Manzione just a week before his fatal accident: [Story here](#)

Details regarding the accident were not immediately available although Williams' wife Sheri had announced on her Facebook page Thursday that he was hospitalized in a coma in Iowa City where he died later in the day. Information regarding services will be announced later.

He wanted the best competition he could get, he wanted to test himself, he was chasing a dream to go out on the PBA50. He had made it out of the PTQ at the WSOB this year and bowled our 10th anniversary event, that's how good he was.

And all just a year after major surgery, lung transplant surgery. Everyone in bowling must feel the same pain and I hope we can find strength knowing he lived a full and happy life. Thoughts with his family and friends.

I recommend bowlers check out the TNBA. Membership is open to all bowlers for about \$25 a season and league sanction fees are just five dollars. TNBA is recognized by the United States Bowling Congress (USBC) and TNBA members are required to be USBC members.

Congratulations to Joseph for his outstanding bowling.




Fred Rivera October 26, 1949 - April 5, 2019

Junior Team USA Girls Win Doubles At 2019 World Bowling Junior Championships

PARIS - Junior Team USA's Kameran Peters and Mabel Cummins may have been the center of attention Saturday at Paris' Institut du Judo, where their stage was a two-lane installation surrounded by bright TV lights and hundreds of bowling fans, but they seemed unfazed by their surroundings as they performed for the energetic audience.

The two were as calm as if the venue that didn't exist 24 hours before was their familiar home bowling center, and they worked together to earn the doubles gold medal at the 2019 World Bowling Junior Championships with a 478-452 victory over Korea's Hong Soree and Jeong Youngseon.

"This feels absolutely amazing," said Peters, who made her Junior Team USA debut this week at the inaugural World Bowling Junior Championships. "We were able to block everything out and stay focused. We concentrated on making the best shots we could, and we communicated the whole time, which really helped us stay in the moment."

Peters left a 10 pin on her first shot but quickly shook off any nerves, rattling off six consecutive strikes on the way to a 277 effort in the one-game match. Cummins added a 201 game to secure the gold medal.

The Junior Team USA girls led by as many as 22 pins, but a 4-6-7 split from Cummins in the eighth frame opened the door for the Koreans. Peters and Cummins led by three pins heading into the final frame, and strikes from each ended Korea's hopes.

"It was really exciting out there, and even with the potential for so many distractions, we were able to block it out and stay focused," said Cummins, also a Masters bronze medalist this week. "Kam and I worked so well together, and it's an honor to say I have won a gold medal with her."

The Current Frame Scoring system was used this week at the World Junior Championships.

In the new system, a strike counts for 30 pins, a spare counts for 10, plus the first-ball count, and an open frame counts for actual pins knocked down. The 10th frame counts the same as all other frames (there's no fill ball), and even with only 10 first balls each game, the maximum score still is 300.

Current Frame Scoring has been featured in recent World Bowling Tour events, the Asian Bowling Federation Tour Finals and the Asian Games.

Saturday's doubles finals didn't end as well for the Junior Team USA boys, who fell to Korea in a high-scoring match, 534-502.

Korea's Park Donghyuk and Ji Geun combined for 15 strikes and posted matching 267 games, while Junior Team USA's Solomon Salama and Anthony Neuer tossed 14 strikes of their own on the way to games of 255 and 247, respectively.

The Koreans were in control the whole match, and a few hiccups along the way were the difference for Salama and Neuer. Neuer missed a 6 pin the second frame and left a 7-10 split in the seventh, while Salama's four-strike start was halted by a 2-4-7-8 combination he was unable to convert.

"If you would've told me before the final that we could've had 502, I would've taken it, for sure, and I would've liked our chances," Neuer said. "They bowled phenomenally, and there wasn't much more we could do. I'm happy with how we performed, even though we didn't win."

Salama and Neuer, both 16-year-old left-handers, are two-time winners at the Junior Gold Championships presented by the Brands of Ebonite, so they, too, were not affected by the grandeur of the venue or the moment.

There were nerves before the action got going Saturday in the custom setup, but they were able to draw on past experience and find comfort in their camaraderie.

"Korea def. Mexico, 2-0 (220-167, 222-197).

It meant a lot to be able to find success on the world stage and show how competitive the bowlers from the United States can be," Salama said. "We are here to represent the country and Team USA, support youth bowling worldwide and win medals, so in that regard, it was a rewarding week."

In all, 105 bowlers (58 boys and 47 girls) representing 35 countries competed in the 2019 World Junior Championships this week, and they bowled for medals in four disciplines - singles, doubles, mixed team and Masters. Medals also were awarded for all-events.

All qualifying rounds and semifinals, plus the singles finals, were held at Plaza Bowling Saint Maximin in nearby Saint-Maximin, France, and livestreamed by World Bowling.

The doubles, Masters and team championship matches all were contested on the special two-lane installation inside the Institut du Judo in the center of Paris, allowing for a more elaborate TV setting and exposure via broadcast to countries and

channels around the world.

Korea's dominance continued in the Masters finals, where Hong and Ji emerged as the gold medalists. Hong defeated her teammate, Jeong, 2-1 (223-264, 215-196, 262-225), and Ji downed Finland's Pyry Puharinen, 2-0 (244-231, 267-236). Jeong and Puharinen each earned silver medals.

Ji's command of the left side and mastery of the week's 41-foot World Bowling Montreal oil pattern resulted in gold medals in singles, doubles, all-events and Masters, and he finished the week by helping Korea top Mexico, 2-0 (220-167, 222-197), in the best-of-three Baker team final.

The four-player mixed team event included the two boys and two girls competing for each country.

Korea and Finland topped the medal table this week in France with 10 medals each and were followed by the United States and Mexico with three apiece. Germany, Philippines and Singapore each earned two medals, and England and Lithuania took home one apiece.

Junior Team USA's three medals were gold in girls doubles, silver in boys doubles and bronze in girls Masters. Neuer just missed an all-events medal, finishing fourth overall.

Junior Team USA head coach Bryan O'Keefe had nothing but praise for all four team members.

"We didn't know what to expect from the lane pattern and the brand new install, but once we got going, the lanes seemed a little cleaner and played like they did toward the end of the week, which was much more comfortable for us," O'Keefe said.

"Kameran bowled an incredible game, and both girls threw about the best shots you ever could ask for in the 10th frame when it mattered most. They were composed and didn't let the elements get to them, and I couldn't be any more proud."

Peters and Cummins, both 16-year-old right-handers, have bowled on TV before. Cummins is a past Junior Gold Championships winner, and Peters made the televised finals of the team-based USA Bowling National Championships.

A two-time Junior Team USA member, Cummins picked up her first world championship last summer. She helped Junior Team USA to the team gold medal at the 2018 World Bowling Youth Championships in the Detroit area.

"We did have a couple of open frames on the boys side, but we did plenty of striking as well, against a team that was dominant all week and carried that momentum into the final," O'Keefe said. "We gave it our best and gave them a good match, and that's all I could ask for."

We put up 500 on TV, and that's an amazing score. It just wasn't enough today. Ultimately, they represented us well and bowled for a gold medal. It was a successful week, and I'm proud of the whole group."


