## Florida Bowler, 15, Is Youngest WIBC Member With 300 Game

In less than one month, 15-year-old Melanie O'Grady of Port Richey, Fla., set one national and one state of Florida record.

O'Grady became the youngest Women's International Bowling Congress member to roll a 300 game in August in the Florida Match Play Tournament at Sunshine Bowl in Pinellas Park, Fla. It was part of a 785 series that she beat just a few weeks later when she bowled 835, a Florida state women's individual series record. The previous standard was 826 by Debi Kidd, who was age 48 when she achieved the feat in St. Petersburg in 1999.

In August, O'Grady finished second in the Ladies Classic Tour event at Cassat's Batt Bowl of Jacksonville, Fla. She also carries the distinction of being the LCT's youngest member.

In other recent record-breaking news:

- Joel Ray became the first bowler with 800s in four consecutive series overall and tied with four others for the most consecutive in the same league with three, all at Northwest Lanes in Fairfield, Ohio. After rolling 823 and 814 in consecutive weeks of the Tuesday Night Social League, he added 812 in the Sam Coleman Memorial Classic, 810 in the Monday Tigers and 801 in the Tuesday Night Social Classic.
- Sue Schottke and Mike Firzak are the first mixed doubles team to combine for a 600 game when they achieved the feat in the AMF-Porters Pub Classic Doubles League at AMF Mil-Sher Lanes in Kenmore, N.Y. Their dual 300 games beat the previous best mixed doubles game of 599 by Allison Johnson and Rob Grimmitt in Oklahoma City in 1994.
- David and Gary Bighman of Brainard, N.Y., now have the most combined career 800 series for brothers with 56. David had 36 and Gary has 20 to move past Mike and Mark Scroggins of Amarillo, Texas, who have 51.
- Linda Goodling's recent 300 game in Lancaster, Pa., gave she, husband Gerald, sons Keith and Kirk and Gerald Goodling's ex-wife Helen McElhenny career perfect games. The brothers started the family off with 300s in 1983. McElhenny added hers in 1992 while the senior Goodling rolled his in 2000.
- Kris Cashmore's 300 game in Kenosha, Wis., made her family the first with mother, daughter and two sons with career 300s. Mother Judith Martins had a perfect game in Racine, Wis., in the 1983-84 season while Steve and Eric Mertins followed in Racine in 1996 and 1999, respectively.
